#### We Are CCU!

Jamar's reflections on our United in Love banquet vividly depict the events of November 10th, 2023, at the Red Lion Hotel's banquet hall. The impactful messages from Rev. James and Lisa's powerful testimony of conquering love and strength lingered in the minds of attendees for weeks.

For CCU, the sight of each representative from churches and other partners across the Tri-County Area served as a powerful reminder. CCU exists because churches, spanning denominations, geographical locations, and ethnic backgrounds, have come together to be Christ's church, dedicated to serving those in the midst of crises and offering Love for the Journey.

While CCU's staff actively responds to Christ's call to love neighbors, the true identity of Christian Churches United is reflected in its 140+ Member Churches. These churches engage and serve in their communities through CCU, collectively providing hope, housing, and support for hundreds of households throughout the city.

Together, WE ARE CCU!

The keynote message was endearing because I have often had to reevaluate myself when it comes to how I show up for people. As a Christ follower, I am told to love others. This is so important.

I have had to rely on GOD to determine if I am giving myself fully in love (as Christ would) to my fellow brothers and sisters. The keynote speech taught me that, differences aside, we are all under the grace of GOD. If Christ, who is GOD in the flesh, humbled himself and served — from spending his first moments on earth in poverty so low that he was with barn animals — how much, then, do we owe, if we are truly earnest in our attempts to be like Christ?

Advocacy for the unhoused was also on full display at the banquet. The event had an arranged setup of a tent to simulate housing conditions for the homeless. This was incredibly touching for me as I have been able to volunteer with CCU and as well as Tent Valley Ministries at various housing encampments across the city. Additionally, lunch packs were left on tables for people to deposit money in — a symbolic act of putting a blessing into a resource (the lunch pack) commonly used by the unhoused population.

There was staff and client appreciation. It was great to see the people who have been leading in service ministry.

A crowning moment came during a powerful testimony. A woman shared who had faced homelessness and twice battled serious health issues, overcame her obstacles with the staff of CCU. She is now in stable housing and her son will be starting college soon! This story taught me so much about hope and resilience!

CCU is a necessary balm in Harrisburg. Connecting area churches with a core mission is integral to what CCU does. As Rev. James preached at the banquet— love is within us all, we just have to share it.

I appreciate you and the help you've given me...You are doing God's work for sure."

Thank you for your support and participation with Joy to the Burg over these past 5 years, we look forward to many more years of bringing Joy to those who are unsheltered across the 'Burg!





It was so good to gather again this year with brothers and sisters from both sides of the river to celebrate the life and work of Martin Luther King Jr. CCU, as part of the Race & Unity Action Coalition, helped organize the worship service and panel discussion which took place at Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church in uptown Harrisburg on Sunday afternoon, Jan. 14. Macedonia's choir led us in an invigorating time of singing & Pastor Rodney Smalls from Macedonia challenged us to reach out to and walk with those living in the tombs, just as Jesus did with the man in Mark 5. Following



#### MEMORIAL BLANKET PROJECT REFLECTIONS

Thursday, December 21, 2023 was the third annual Memorial Blanket Project art installation. In 2021, it was hosted in Carlisle, PA. Last year it was at the West Lawn of the US Capitol. And this year, it was hosted at the PA Capitol. Each year, we never know how many blankets we will have, who is going to show up to help out, or what the weather will be like. And each year more blankets than we guess show up, volunteers come out of the woodwork, and the weather is amazing. This year we worked in conjunction with partners in Akron, OH, who also had an installation of blankets and together we had over 1200 blankets.



This was the first year that those who were without a house or shelter were right there at the event and we were able to give out blankets, gloves, and socks to people during the event. We had the honor of interviewing one of these folks for our podcast so he could share his lived experience. Another woman wandered into the event wearing just a shirt. It looked as though she had just been released from some kind of medical facility, but we didn't know for sure. We did know that without a blanket and some direction to the local shelter, she may not have survived the night. These instances and interactions put human faces and names on what poverty and homelessness is about. It's about real lives and real people.

Using the blankets as an art installation is an act of symbolism. It conveys a clear visual message that cannot be ignored when it is seen. Each blanket will have someone wrapping it around them very soon, if not already. That's over 700 people just in the Harrisburg area alone. Every society will have the poor. It's our responsibility to see the humanity of those in poverty and on the margins and in so doing, to see ourselves in them. And to see the value and worth they bring to a society. And to hear their voice and their stories so that we can make adjustments so that others don't fall into poverty. The poor will always be with us. And part of that is seeing our own poverty as well.



The Memorial Blanket Project is impactful. It is meaningful. It is symbolic. It is inconvenient. It is eye opening. It is affirming. It is humanity.
