Persevering With Hope By Steve Schwartz, Director of Development How One Man Worked Through Trials and Roadblocks to Finally Get His Own Housing

I magine fighting kidney disease and needing dialysis weekly. Then losing a foot and part of your leg to infection. Then becoming homeless.

This is Max's story. He was dealing with his many medical issues when the family member he was staying with lost their housing. After a few days literally on the street he called HELP Ministries. This is where he met Lisa last April.

Lisa's immediate concern was that no area shelters were really equipped to handle Max's disability and on-going medical issues. These included an open wound that had yet to heal from his amputation surgery three years ago. Lisa felt for Max and said "I won't let you fall through the cracks. We will figure this out together." That day a journey and a partnership began.

First, Lisa helped Max get into a hotel room provided by HELP Ministries. After 5 months, funding was no longer available and he had to leave the hotel. Lisa felt like she had failed Max. But Max kept his head up. He was so appreciative for all she had done.

Lisa was upset that he had to leave the hotel and become homeless again. Thankfully, due to some kind friends, Max was able to crash on a couch here and there while he and Lisa continued to look for housing.

Accept what is, let go of what was, and have Faith in what will be.

We are protecting Max's privacy by not using his real name or a picture of him in this article. But he let us snap a photo of this artwork on his living room wall.

Lisa and Max worked together to navigate bureaucracy and overcome hurdles. So much red tape. So much paper work. Lisa would call and say "I need this document" and Max would find a way to get it to her as soon as possible.

By working through the Coordinated Entry* process for homeless individuals, Max was approved for an 811 housing voucher based on his disability. Now, they had to find a landlord willing to accept this type of housing voucher and work with a tenant with a criminal record. The apartment also had to be accessible for someone with Max's disability. Lisa worked hard to get him approved for an apartment in Dauphin County outside the city of Harrisburg, but it fell through. Then an opening came up in the city, but the city housing authority wouldn't... *(Continued page 2)*

* HELP Ministries is the central hub for the Coordinated Entry System for Dauphin County. We coordinate with agencies county-wide to rapidly assess a homeless person's vulnerability and connect them to any available housing options.

...consider Max due to his criminal record. So Lisa and Max switched their focus back to the county.

"People work hard to turn their life around, but so many public housing options rule out people with a criminal record. Where are they supposed to live?" Lisa asked. "Many people get so frustrated hitting roadblocks while trying to do the right thing, they give up and return to past behaviors. But not Max. He was determined. Sometimes it feels like the system is designed to make you give up."

Max added "I told Lisa at one point, I'll take anything. If I have to navigate a third floor apartment, I'll take it. How about a fancy ditch? I'll take anything."

About nine months after Max came to HELP Ministries, they finally had a breakthrough. Lisa found an apartment in Steelton. The rent was doable with the housing voucher and the landlord was willing to work with him.

The apartment is lovely. A spacious one bedroom with kitchen, bathroom, and living room. When I visited, Max's aunt from out of town was visiting. He's so glad to have his own place so he can visit with friends and family again.

"I think I am one of the lucky ones," Max says, exuding gratitude. "People say 'oh you've got kidney disease, you have it so hard.' With everything you go through, there is no use complaining. You ask God to give you patience and guess what? They make you wait. And you learn patience. You gotta learn from past mistakes. And you have to be thankful for your blessings no matter how they come."

"When you are on the street all you can think about is the next 24 hours: what will I eat, where will I sleep, how will I handle the weather... You get so used to living in crisis mode, there is little energy to make a plan."

Max continued, "This whole experience was eye opening to me. No one wants to be homeless. When you are on the street all you can think about is the next 24 hours: what will I eat, where will I sleep, how will I handle the weather. I want some water, do I even have a cup? You get so used to living in crisis mode, there is little energy to make a plan. I'm so thankful for all the help to get my own place."

Max is currently scheduling a follow-up surgery to his amputation, hoping it will resolve the wound issue. When he recovers, he hopes to get on the list for a kidney transplant. He also hopes to get his driver's license so he can visit his aunt in Delaware. Watching Max and Lisa interact, it is clear that they formed a bond, a team working together to overcome Max's dire situation. He is so grateful for her, and she is so impressed with his determination and gratitude. They both wanted to share this glimpse of what the ministry of HELP and CCU meant to Max this past year.

As we finished our discussion, I asked if there was anything we didn't cover in his journey? Is there anything missing? "Just my leg," Max offered with a smirk. Amidst all he has faced, he retains a smile and a sense of humor. I felt blessed to have this time with him and Lisa. •

Encampment Closure Rallies CCU and Partners

In late January, the City of Harrisburg announced they were requiring everyone living in an encampment of unhoused people under the Mulberry St. bridge to move. The rationale was two-fold: a rat infestation due to a trash build-up and a rise in criminal activity. CCU leadership and our Street Outreach Team mobilized to support folks in finding a place to relocate, as well as engage broader community members who were interested in helping. Here's a summary of what we were able to accomplish together and some thoughts for continued ministry going forward.

We worked actively with the following partners:

• Capital Area Coalition on Homelessness, the City of Harrisburg, Downtown Daily Bread, UPMC Central PA Street Medicine Team, Dauphin County Crisis Intervention, Young Professionals of Color, The Eclipse

Project, Starfish Ministries, The Belong Collective, Fox's Wash and Go, AMiracle4Sure, and the Foundation For Enhancing Communities

- We physically helped around 10 people to relocate pallets, tents, and their possessions in order to establish themselves at a new location with the resources that could allow them to be safe in the winter weather. We provided hotel space for another 7 individuals who were in the process of securing apartments or had significant medical issues that needed attention.
- We helped nine people do laundry before relocating so they could have a fresh start at their new location.

The timing of this effort came as we were set to hold our first in-person Compassion Action Network meeting since the beginning of the pandemic. The Compassion Action Network (CAN) rallies churches and volunteers to work collaboratively with our staff as well as other human service and government agencies to avoid duplication of services and strategically support our neighbors on the street. On Friday, Jan. 27, we had over 20 people join us to continue the conversation about how we can support those on the streets moving forward. We especially want to engage the community in better organizing outreach to the encampments and understanding that some ways of donating cause more harm than good (i.e. dropping off food and clothing without being sure it is wanted or needed at that particular time contributed to the trash build up and rat infestation under the bridge).

Impact of Joy to the Burg Grows

In 2019, Sheldon Jones pitched the idea of creating and selling a Christmas album of local artists to fund our homelessness programs. At that time we couldn't imagine the tremendous impact of this project in just four years. In 2022:

- ⇒ We released our 4th album featuring 33 songs.
- The Central Pennsylvania Music Hall of Fame joined as our music curation partner, raising our profile in the local music community.
- ⇒ Susquehanna Art Museum added the visual arts to the project, curating a selection of greeting cards by local
- ⇒ We held our 3rd hour-long TV special on ABC27, and hosted a full day of live music at The Englewood in Hershey.

Since 2019, over 50 artists have contributed 84 songs, generating a wonderful library of Christmas music benefitting the homelessness community and the local music scene.

Since 2019, Joy to the Burg has provided over **450 people** on the street with over 14,000 nights of sleeping in a warm bed with staff support, while 90 people have been assisted to obtain and maintain long-term housing through the following programs:

- 1) Women's and men's Winter Overnight Shelters
- 2) Street Outreach Team helping people on the street to obtain long-term housing
- Long-term housing for men who were chronically homeless at Susquehanna Harbor Safe Haven
